
Alvin Karpis and the Barker Gang: Minnesota's Notorious Outlaws



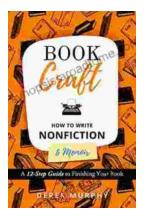
